ensuring a successful future for Birmingham. As such, I am pleased about progress that is already being made on important topics such as sustainability and the needs of our seniors.

The City's recently formed Environmental Sustainability Committee (ESC) collected in-person and online community feedback for their work on the creation of a Sustainability and Climate Action Plan. The plan will better position Birmingham for a changing future by instituting policies and practices that protect the natural environment and reduce extreme weather impacts on the community. In addition, the work of the ESC will include a greenhouse gas emissions inventory to set a baseline and develop greenhouse gas emission reduction targets for 2030 and 2050. Like sustainability, the needs of our aging population is one of our strategic goals and an area of critical importance. As you may know, the City recently purchased the Birmingham YMCA building located at 400 East Lincoln Street after learning that the YMCA planned to sell the building. Clerk's Office staff members are hard at work preparing for the election on Tuesday, November 7. They are helping residents understand changes such as in-person early voting, the new permanent ballot list and more. Turn to page 5 to learn about these changes and what you will see on your ballot, including a proposed amendment to marihuana establishments and a senior millage proposition.

Another new development is the addition of our K9 Police Therapy Dog, Maple. Our fluffy Bernese Mountain dog creates a lot of joy at City Hall, both to guests and staff members. Residents have fully embraced Maple, whom they helped name with nearly 600 name suggestions and 500 votes on our public engagement platform, Engage Birmingham. By the time this newsletter is published, Maple will be five months old and undoubtedly much heavier than her current 36 pounds. ### NEW COMMITTEE AIMS TO IMPROVE HEALTH, SAFETY AND WELFARE OF SENIORS

Michigan is aging, and the Birmingham area is no exception. Birmingham, Beverly Hills, Bingham Farms and Franklin households with seniors are expected to increase by more than 50% by 2045, with a significant percentage of 65+ residents living alone.

The recently formed Ad Hoc Aging in Place Committee is studying current demographic trends and evaluating the needs of the City's aging population. They will prepare a City-wide action plan outlining the vision and goals to improve the health, safety and welfare of senior citizens and encourage residents to age comfortably in Birmingham.

In alignment with the City's strategic goals, the committee was formed around the same time the City purchased the YMCA building at 400 East Lincoln Street – the future home of Next. Next is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization which has been serving the community for over 45 years, offering support services that focus on allowing older adults to live independently. The YMCA had planned to sell the building on Lincoln Street, creating a unique opportunity for Birmingham, the surrounding communities and Next. In addition to a permanent home for Next, the facility is planned for use as a senior/recreation center. Learn more about Next on page 14.



### **NOVEMBER 7 LOCAL ELECTION NEWS**

Birmingham's next election is Tuesday, November 7, 2023. In this local election, voters will select four City Commissioners and three Library Board members, all for 4-year terms.

The City Commission candidates are Clinton Baller, Brad Host, Anthony Long and Therese Longe. The Library Board candidates are Wendy Friedman, Karen Gilbert Rock, Curtis Trimble and Jennifer Wheeler.

The ballot will also include two ballot proposals:

- A senior millage proposition (.33 mill levy for a three-year term). Visit bhamgov.org/seniormillage for more information.
- A proposed amendment regarding marihuana establishments. Residents will vote on a proposed amendment to Part II of the Birmingham City Code, Chapter 26 – Businesses, Article XII – Marihuana Establishments. Visit bhamgov.org/cannabis for more information.



### **ABSENTEE BALLOTS NOW AVAILABLE**

Voters who wish to vote absentee in the upcoming election will need to complete an absentee ballot application. Applications were mailed to those on the permanent absent voter list in late August, and are available from the Clerk's Office and online at mi.gov/vote. Absentee ballots will be mailed and available in the Clerk's Office in late September. New this year, voters will enjoy free return postage for absentee ballot applications and absentee ballot return envelopes mailed within the U.S.



### NEW OPTIONS FOR EARLY, ABSENTEE AND OVERSEAS VOTING

The passage of Proposal 2022-2 last November added early voting and other new election policies to the Michigan Constitution. While many of these changes will not take effect until the 2024 election cycle, several components will be in place in time for Birmingham's November 7 local election, including:

### Early voting option

Proposal 2022-2 created a constitutional right to no less than nine days of early in-person voting for not less than eight hours per day in each statewide and federal election, which occur in even years. Although Birmingham's 2023 election is neither type, the City is working with Oakland County Elections Division, Bloomfield Township and Southfield Township on a pilot program to offer early voting at the Bloomfield Township Library before this year's November 7 election. From Oct. 28 through Nov. 5, early in-person voting will be available daily at the Bloomfield Township Library and Oakland County's Waterford Oaks County Park. Details were still being finalized at press time and will be communicated to voters as soon as possible. If you receive an absentee ballot for this election and later decide to vote in person, either early or on Election Day, please bring your absentee ballot when you come to vote.

### New permanent ballot list

The absentee ballot application for the November 7 election will include a checkbox with language for voters to opt in to a new list, the permanent ballot list. In future elections, absentee ballot applications will not be required for voters on this new list; voters on the permanent ballot list will automatically be mailed a ballot for every non-partisan election. In partisan primary elections, such as the 2024 presidential primary, voters will still need to respond to a mailing and select their desired ballot type.

### NOVEMBER 2023 ELECTION DATES TO REMEMBER

**Oct. 23:** last day to register to vote by mail or online and be eligible to vote in the November election; after this, new voters must register in person with proof of address at the clerk's office until after the election.

**Oct. 28 – Nov. 5:** early in-person voting available daily at the Bloomfield Township Library and Oakland County's Waterford Oaks County Park. Times and additional details are to be determined and will be communicated to voters as soon as possible.

Nov. 3 at 5 p.m.: last day to request that an absentee ballot be mailed to you

**Nov. 3 at 5 p.m.:** last day for voters who returned a voted absentee ballot to spoil it and receive a new ballot in person from the clerk's office

Nov. 4 from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m.: clerk's office open on Saturday for election business

**Nov. 6 at 4 p.m.:** last day for voters who lost or never received an absentee ballot to pick up one in person at the clerk's office

Nov. 7 from 7 a.m. – 8 p.m.: polling places open for in-person voting

Nov. 7 at 8 p.m.: absentee ballots must be received by clerk's office to be counted

**Nov. 13:** Military and Overseas (MOVE) ballots mailed from outside the United States and postmarked on or before Nov. 7 must be received by the clerk's office to be counted



It is hard to pick just one sustainability topic to discuss that has some relevance through the October-April window in which this edition of the newsletter runs. One thing that is certain, though, is that this date range contains many holidays – holidays that generate a serious amount of waste every year in the United States. Whether it be food, packaging, or discarding of aged/unwanted items, the problem compounds an ever growing and serious issue. So many excellent strategies can reduce your impact without losing any of the magic that comes with these holidays. The following is a non-exhaustive list of easy places to start; there are always opportunities to do more.

- Responsible Recycling Become very familiar with what SOCRRA can accept in your curbside recycling bins (as well as at their drop-off centers) and recycle items properly! When in doubt, use the SOCRRA Waste Wizard tool for guidance.
- 2. Reduce Food Waste When cooking for large gatherings, it is imperative that you plan ahead to keep food out of the trash. Planning for the preparation of food, quantity of food, and reusability/storage of such can go a long way.
- 3. Thoughtful Gifting It is the thought that counts! Consider gifting items with minimal or no additional wrapping/preparation, or consider gifts that need no packaging. In addition, consider sourcing your gifts from local businesses to reduce packaging waste and carbon emissions.

### SERGEANT MCCANHAM APPOINTED AS FULL-TIME SCHOOL **RESOURCE OFFICER**

The Birmingham Police Department and the Birmingham School District established an agreement to provide a full-time School Resource Officer (SRO) for the 2023-2024 school year. An SRO is a law enforcement officer who is assigned to work in the schools. SROs serve as a liaison between the school community, law enforcement, and the local community. Their primary role is to promote safety and security within the school environment while also building positive relationships with students, staff, and parents.

In early August, the Birmingham Police Department announced Officer Kyle McCanham was promoted to Sergeant and appointed as the fulltime SRO for Birmingham Public Schools, assigned to Seaholm High School. He graduated from Central Michigan University Summa Cum Laude in 2018 and was hired as an officer with the Birmingham Police Department shortly thereafter. He worked the last year and a half as a special task force officer with the Oakland County Sheriff's Office -Narcotics Enforcement Team. Sergeant McCanham is excited to take on this role and build positive relationships with Birmingham students, parents and staff. He will work primarily at Seaholm High School and will handle issues at other Birmingham district schools (within the City) as needed. When school is not in session, he will report back to the Police Department and assist with investigations, patrol duties, special events and traffic enforcement.





- February 8 (Black History Month) The Civil Rights Movement in the 1970s and Birmingham's CREEM Magazine – This important rock magazine published in Birmingham delved into the intersection of race, class, and music during this period of cultural change.
- March 14 (Women's History Month) The Prindle Sisters: Birmingham's Pioneer Women - They came as brides to the unknown frontier of Oakland County wilderness after the War of 1812, bringing little else but each other, and faced many hardships to build early Birmingham.

### PREPARE YOUR HOME FOR FALL AND WINTER

As the days grow shorter and the temperatures start to drop, it's time to shift our focus toward preparing our homes and properties for the colder months ahead. Proper preparation can help you avoid potential issues and ensure a safe, comfortable and energy-efficient living environment throughout the fall and winter seasons. To assist in this endeavor, follow these tips\*:

- HVAC System Maintenance: Schedule a professional inspection and servicing of your heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system. Regular maintenance ensures that your system operates efficiently, provides optimal indoor comfort, and minimizes the risk of breakdowns during colder weather.
- Seal Windows and Doors: Inspect your windows and doors for gaps or drafts that could allow cold air to enter your home. Seal any openings with weather-stripping or caulk.
- Insulate Pipes and Water Heater: Protect your pipes from freezing by insulating them, especially those in unheated or exposed areas. Adding insulation to your water heater reduces heat loss and lowers energy consumption.
- Clean Gutters and Downspouts: Clear your gutters and downspouts of leaves and debris. This will prevent water buildup and potential damage to your roof and foundation during fall rain and winter snowmelt.

- 8. Check Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Detectors: Test and replace the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. These devices are essential for your family's safety during the colder months when heating systems are in use.
- Chimney and Fireplace Maintenance: If you have a chimney and fireplace, have them inspected, cleaned and serviced by a certified professional before using them each winter.
- 10. Winter Emergency Kit: Assemble a winter emergency kit containing essentials such as blankets, flashlights, batteries, non-perishable food, and bottled water in case of severe weather or power outages.
- 11. Prepare for Snow and Ice Removal: Stock up on snow shovels, ice melt, and other winter weather tools. Be ready to remove snow from driveways, walkways, steps and other areas to prevent slips and falls
- 12. Save on Energy Bills: Consider installing a programmable thermostat to adjust temperatures when you're not at home or while sleeping. This energy-saving measure can help reduce heating costs.

### **LEAF COLLECTION**

### **Curbed Streets**

On streets with curbs ONLY, curbside leaf collection begins Monday, October 9, 2023. The schedule shown below provides for collections in each zone of the community. To minimize safety concerns, leaves should be raked into the street immediately next to the curb no sooner than the weekend prior to your collection period. Be sure leaf piles do not obstruct traffic, and do not rake leaves into the street after your final collection date.



### **Uncurbed Streets**

For residents living on uncurbed streets, you may place leaves in brown yard waste bags for collection on your regular refuse collection day. Leaves may also be placed in an approved trash can with a yard waste sticker affixed to the side.

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### YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Yard waste collection will end on December 15, 2023. After that date, yard waste may be taken to the SOCRRA Troy Transfer Station (located at 14 Mile and Coolidge) at no charge during the winter months.



### **HOLIDAY SCHEDULE**

Due to the Thanksgiving holiday, trash collection will be delayed one-day for those whose regular collection falls on a Thursday and Friday (Wednesday pick-up not affected). Please note that trash collection will be one day delayed for all residents during the week of December 25 and the week of January 1.



### CHRISTMAS TREE CHIPPER SCHEDULE

Chipper service for Christmas trees will be offered during the month of January. Simply place your bare Christmas tree on the easement (between the sidewalk and curb). Trees will not be picked up if they have a base, lights, ornaments or bags.



### **BE AWARE OF SNOW ORDINANCE**

- You are required to clear sidewalks that abut your home of any snow and ice.
- 2. When a Snow Emergency is declared and/or when there are 4 inches of snow or more, residents must remove their cars from the streets so the snow plows can get through. Cars in violation of this ordinance will be ticketed. To view the complete ordinance, visit bhamgov.org/code.



### **BRUSH CHIPPER**

Please be advised beginning the third week of November, brush chipping is on a call-in basis only. Normal chipper service will resume in the spring.



### EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT BULKY ITEM PICKUP

### What you can place at the curb:

Each week residents may place several bags of trash (each bag must be under 50 pounds) at the curb for normal refuse pickup. The following items may also be set out on your normal trash day: couches (under 8 feet), refrigerators (take doors off), stoves, washers, dryers, mattresses, box springs, carpeting (rolled and tied under 4 feet) and toilets. Please ensure all items are at your curb by 7 a.m. on your trash day.

### Items not considered household waste:

Residents may contact the city's refuse hauler, Car Trucking, in advance at (586) 791-8480 to either pay a fee for pickup or to get recommendations on other methods of disposal for the following items: privacy fences, decks, sheds, roofing material, contractor's construction debris, bricks, tile or cement. If you have special project debris such as dirt and sod, please consider renting a rubber wheeled dumpster from a private company.



### RECYCLING INFORMATION

SOCRRA'S recycling drop-off center is open by appointment only. If you have any hazardous materials or liquids that you need to dispose of, please visit SOCRRA.org to schedule an appointment.

### STREETS, SEWER, AND WATER INFRASTRUCTURE ENHANCEMENT PROJECTS

The 2023 construction season has been busy, and the following is an overview of the capital improvement projects that will be completed this fall:



### CRANBROOK NON-MOTORIZED SHARED USE PATH (TAP GRANT)

A new 10'-wide shared use path will be installed on the west side of Cranbrook Road from 14 Mile Road to Midvale Street, and new a sidewalk along:

- The east side of Cranbrook Road from Northlawn Boulevard to Midvale Street
- The south side of Lincoln Street from Cranbrook Road to Arden Lane
- 14 Mile Road from the west city limits to Cranbrook Road



### SEWER REHABILITATION PROGRAM AND BACKYARD SEWER LINING

The City is working on televising, cleaning, and lining sewers in various locations throughout the City. We are continuing to rehabilitate backyard sewers in the Quarton Lake neighborhood and plan to complete the remaining portion this fall and winter.



### PIERCE STREET, 14 MILE ROAD TO LINCOLN STREET

This project will include water main improvements, ADA ramp upgrades, full-depth road reconstruction for trench end excavations and other repairs.



### LEAD SERVICE REPLACEMENT PROGRAM

The Lead Service Replacement Program will continue in 2024. If you received a letter or notification about your lead service, please contact the authorized City representative at (248) 303-2292 to schedule a replacement of your water service.



### WATER SERVICE MATERIAL VERIFICATION PROGRAM

The City verified water service material type outside of 364 randomly selected properties. As a reminder, the "In-Home/Business" water service line material needs to be determined as part of this program and included in the City's reporting to the State of Michigan. If you received previous letters or notifications about this program, please schedule an inspection with the authorized City representative at (248) 303-2292 or you may determine the in-home/business material yourself with the steps provided in the property owner letter.
