

MICHIGAN'S NEW PERMANENT MAIL BALLOT LIST

Voters can now join Michigan's "permanent mail ballot list" to automatically receive an absentee ballot by mail before every election. Voters on the new list will not receive an application for the ballot – just the ballot when it becomes available approximately 40 days before each election.

More than 4,500 Birmingham voters have migrated to the permanent ballot list. This list is different from the permanent absent voter list used in the 2020-2023 elections, which required voters to return an application before receiving an absent voter ballot. Voters on the old list will not automatically be transferred to the new list. If you have not yet joined the permanent mail ballot list and wish to do so, look for a checkbox on a future absentee ballot application, or send a written request to the Clerk's Office at elections@bhamgov.org or 151 Martin Street, Birmingham MI 48009.







ADDRESS CHANGES

It is a voter's responsibility to notify the clerk's office of any changes to their mailing address two months before each election. Absentee ballots cannot be forwarded. If you will be at a vacation home, away at college or briefly staying at a different address, please provide your temporary ballot mailing address by emailing elections@bhamgov.org or submit it online at mi.gov/vote.

Voters who do not wish to be on the list will still be able to request an absentee ballot directly from their local clerk's office. Learn more about absentee ballots and elections at mi.gov/vote and bhamgov.org/voting.



BECOME AN ELECTION INSPECTOR

THINKING ABOUT INSTALLING A WHOLE HOUSE GENERATOR? HERE'S WHAT TO KNOW.

During spring, the world is full of promise and new beginnings. It's no surprise that the harshness of winter, especially blizzards and power outages, can feel like a foggy memory. However, power outages are not limited to the winter months, as many are caused during spring and summer storms. Many residents have prepared for power outages by installing whole house generators. Electrical and mechanical permits are required for generator installations. If you are considering installing a generator, the following paragraphs will provide you with useful information.

The Zoning Ordinance limits the placement of the generator on your lot. They cannot be located in any portion of the required front or side yard setbacks. In addition, the manufacturer's specifications provide the distance the generator must maintain between the unit and the house, operable windows and ventilation openings to help prevent carbon monoxide from entering the home. Carbon monoxide detectors will be required to alert you in the event some of the gas does enter. The following documents are required when applying for permits to assist staff in determining where the generator will be installed in accordance with the ordinance and building codes:

- A site plan must be provided that clearly identifies setback distances to property lines and clearances to building openings and vents.
 Please clearly state these measurements on the plan.
- The manufacturer's installation manual for the generator must be included.
- Verification that your gas meter is capable of providing enough fuel flow for the new generator and all household appliances such as the furnace, water heater, clothes dryer, ovens and stoves, etc.

Power outages are inevitable because bad weather can happen anywhere and anytime. However, not having electricity, even for a short time, can make your home uncomfortable and create bigger problems than spoiled food. Standby generators are a great option because they allow you to continue to use your electricity even when the power is out. This means that your lights, kitchen appliances, heating and cooling systems, and even your computer and television can continue to work throughout an outage.

LEAF BLOWERS

A MESSAGE FROM PLANNING DIRECTOR, NICHOLAS DUPUIS

It is spring cleanup time! For sustainable spring cleanup tips that will help improve your yard's relationship with the environment, check out April's edition of the Around Town e-Newsletter at bhamgov.org/aroundtown. In this edition of the Birmingham Beat, though, I would like to take the opportunity to broach a separate but somewhat related matter — leaf blowers. Now is the time to consider reducing or eliminating the use of two-stroke, gas-powered leaf blowers whether it is your own, or whether it is a service. As the City works to eliminate the use of two-stroke gas powered leaf blowers in the City to reduce emissions, noise, and negative environmental impacts, your contribution to the effort is essential. This year, you can lessen your impact by considering contractors that utilize electric equipment, raking/hand clearing wherever possible, or replacing an end-of-life leaf blower with an electric one.

AVOID FINES-KEEP GRASS & WEEDS BELOW EIGHT INCHES

Birmingham's ordinance requires grass and weeds be kept below eight inches. Poison ivy, ragweed or any other poisonous, noxious or unhealthy growths are prohibited. View the Grass and Noxious Weed ordinance at www.bhamgov.org/code.



BRUSH CHIPPING

The chipper truck resumes its routine cycle in April. It takes the chipper 7 to 10 business days to cycle the city, depending on weather conditions and the volume of brush out for chipping. Brush and limbs that are at least 4 feet long and up to 4-5 inches in diameter should be stacked at the curb with all cut ends facing the same direction.



YARD WASTE DECAL

Acceptable yard waste containers are trash cans with "yard waste" decals (available at the City Clerk's office) or 30-gallon paper yard waste bags. Yard waste containers must weigh less than 50 pounds, and yard waste must be small enough (under 4 feet in length) to fit in the designated container. Curbside collection is provided from April 1 through the third Friday in December.



BULKY ITEMS

Wondering what items can be placed at the curb and what requires a bulky item pick-up fee?

Place at curb:

Couches (under 8 feet), fridges (take doors off), stoves, washers, dryers, mattresses, box springs, carpeting (rolled and tied under 4 feet) and toilets are all acceptable items to place at your curb by 7 am on your trash day (no additional fee required).

Advance notice and pick-up fee required:

Cast iron items such as tubs or sinks, hot tubs, trampolines, play structures, basketball metal hoops, pianos, chain link, wood, and PVC fences, decks, sheds, roofing material, railroad ties and more than normal large amounts of trash (usually move outs) require a bulky item pick-up fee. Please call Car Trucking at (586) 791-8480 in advance to schedule a bulky item pick-up.



HOLIDAY TRASH SCHEDULE

City offices will be closed Friday, March 29 to observe Good Friday (normal refuse collection), Monday, May 27 to observe Memorial Day (refuse collection delayed one day that week), and Wednesday, June 19 to observe Juneteenth (normal refuse collection).





NEXT STEPS FOR PARKS & REC BOND PROJECTS AND MASTER PLAN

In November 2020, the Birmingham Parks and Recreation Bond was approved by over 70% of voters! Completed projects from the first bond issue include Ice Arena improvements and locker room expansion, Adams Park, pickleball courts and a Trail Improvement Concept Plan. So, what's next?



NEXT BOND ISSUE

The 2024 bond issue targets citywide playground improvements, focusing on inclusion and accessibility at parks such as Poppleton, Pembroke, Lincoln Well, and St. James, among others, in addition to trail improvements and accessible walking paths. The Parks and Recreation Board will also consider restrooms, dog and bicycle infrastructure, adult fitness stations, sustainability pilots and education programs, benches, places to rest, Wi-Fi, food trucks, yard game pilots, and recycling throughout the park system as we move forward with improvements.

CONTINUED TRAIL IMPROVEMENTS

Design work for construction is currently underway for the first phase of trail improvements in Booth Park. This includes features such as an entry plaza with seating and landscaping, an accessible restroom, and trail entry identifiers and signage. Designs will be reviewed with the public by the Parks and Recreation Board and ultimately by the City Commission for approval. Construction is anticipated to occur in the spring of 2025 at Booth Park. View the trail improvement plan at bhamgov.org/trailimprovements.



2023 was a big year for planning and public engagement, as our 5 year Parks and Recreation Plan needed an update. STREETS, SEWER AND WATER INFRASTRUCTURE ENHANCEMENTS COMING THIS YEAR

2024 construction projects will be start soon throughout the City! The following is an overview of upcoming capital improvement projects.

2023 Sewer Rehabilitation Program

The project will be completed this spring and includes cleaning and televising the sewer, and adding sewer lining at various locations.

2023-2024 Asphalt Resurfacing Program

Pavement resurfacing will occur on various streets throughout the City this year. Visit bhamgov.org/engineering to view a list of locations for this program. The City will also complete crack sealing and rejuvenation on various streets.

2023-2024 Cape Seal Program

The 2023-2024 Cape Seal Program includes unimproved streets in various locations throughout the City. Visit bhamgov.org/capeseal to view a list of locations.

Redding Road

This project will include water and sewer system improvements, ADA ramp upgrades, and full-depth road reconstruction from Lakepark to Woodward Ave.

Edgewood Avenue

This project will include the replacement of the 1929 sewer from E. Lincoln to Catalpa, the installation of a new 8" water main from Catalpa to Southlawn, ADA ramp upgrades, and full-depth road reconstruction from E. Lincoln to Southlawn.

Oakland Ave. and Haynes Street

This project will include minor sewer repairs, abandoning the existing $6^{\prime\prime}$ water main, reconfiguration of the N. Old Woodward and Oakland intersection, and resurfacing the road from Old Woodward to Woodward .

Arlington Road and Shirley Drive

This project will include water and sewer system improvements and the installation of asphalt pavement at the current dimensions of the streets from W. Lincoln to Maple Road.

North Adams Road

This project includes minor sewer and water main repairs, reducing the roadway to three lanes and resurfacing the road from Madison to the north city limits.

Woodward and Brown/Forest Intersection Improvements

This spring MDOT will improve pedestrian crossing and traffic signals at Woodward and Brown, and Woodward and Forest. There will be a one-lane closure on Woodward, and there will be times when Brown and Forest will be closed for up to 10 days for construction.


Lead Service Replacement Program Progress

The Lead Service Replacement Program continues, with the goal to replace all lead services in the City by the end of this year. The City recently mailed a letter to property owners with known lead water services, instructing them to schedule the replacement of their water service for free. The City will soon begin a door-knocking effort to reach remaining residents with known lead water services. If the property owner is not available, a flier will be left. If you receive this notice from the City, please follow the steps to schedule your water service replacement.

Water Service Verification Program

The City has a deadline of October 2024 to submit material information for 364 randomly selected water services to the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE). The City will be knocking on doors to talk to property owners about verifying the "In-Home/Business" water service line material. If a property owner is not home, a flier will be left with the next steps.

WARM WEATHER TIPS FROM THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

With warmer weather on the horizon and summer months approaching, now is a good time to review tips from the Fire Department to ensure a fun and safe summer.

Fire Pits

Every year the Birmingham Fire Department responds to burn complaints. The usage of fire pits is addressed in the International Fire Code adopted by the City. Recreational fire pits less than 3 feet in diameter and 2 feet high are allowed in approved containers and must have a 15-foot clearance on all sides from structures and combustible materials. Fires larger than this are considered to be bonfires and are NOT allowed without a permit issued by the Fire Marshal. The fire department investigates all burn complaints. Those that are deemed to be hazardous or without a permit can be ordered by the fire code official to be extinguished.

Barbecues

Barbecues are also a summer hit. However, they have limitations as to where they can be utilized. Open flame cooking devices of any kind cannot be utilized on combustible balconies or within 10 feet of combustible construction. There are exceptions, such as one and two-family dwellings or balconies that are protected by fire suppression sprinklers. For barbecues that utilize liquid propane (LP) tanks, please store them in a cool spot in the garage or shed. LP tanks should never be stored inside a home, building or apartment.

Fireworks

According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), fireworks cause over 19,500 fires and send more than 11,500 people to emergency rooms every year. Remember, once fireworks are airborne there is no guarantee where they will land. Dried landscapes, trees, vehicles, wood decks and anything on the ground is susceptible to fire when fireworks land. Birmingham firefighters have been busy the past few years with fires and medical emergencies related to fireworks. Remember, it is unlawful for a person to ignite, discharge, or use consumer fireworks on public property, school property, church property, or the property of another person without that organization's or person's expressed permission to use those fireworks on those premises. In doing so, violators will receive a civil ticket of \$1,000.

State of Michigan fireworks laws allow fireworks on the following dates and times:

- 11 a.m. on December 31 1 a.m. on January 1
- 11 a.m. 11:45 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding Memorial Day
- 11 a.m. 11:45 p.m. on June 29 and 30 and July 1, 2, 3, and 4
- 11 a.m. 11:45 p.m. on July 5, IF that date is on a Friday or Saturday
- 11 a.m. 11:45 p.m. on the Saturday and Sunday immediately preceding Labor Day

REMOVE VALUABLES AND LOCK VEHICLE DOORS

As we all look forward to warmer weather and enjoying the outdoors, so do some with criminal intentions. Last year the Police Department responded to 53 reports of larceny of personal property from vehicles (LFAs). These crimes can lead to identity theft and fraud. In many cases, vehicles were left unlocked with valuables in plain sight.

We want to remind everyone to lock their vehicles, and make your vehicle less desirable to thieves by not leaving anything of value inside. When possible, park in a well-lit area and in view of a camera if applicable.

Earlier this year, the Birmingham Police Department along with neighboring jurisdictions arrested several subjects that travel around the United States making a living from stealing items from vehicles. PEWABIC POTTERY FOUNDER MARY CHASE PERRY STRATTON MEMORIAL TILE INSTALLED AT GREENWOOD CEMETERY AND FEATURED DURING SPRING TOUR

Famous ceramicist Mary Chase Perry Stratton (1867-1961) co-founded Detroit's Pewabic Pottery in 1903, and her characteristic iridescent glazing has been sought after ever since. Perry was an accomplished artist of the early Arts and Crafts movement in Detroit. She lived in Birmingham briefly with her brother Frederick Perry before launching her successful pottery, which is still active today.

Mary Chase Perry remained a single woman until her early fifties, devoting herself to her work and the advancement of ceramic arts. Although she lived in Detroit and Grosse Pointe for decades, she and her late-in-life husband, architect William (Buck) Stratton, are buried in Birmingham's Greenwood Cemetery near her brother and other relatives.



To bring recognition to Mary Chase Perry (Stratton's) historic importance and accomplishments, the Friends of the Birmingham Museum have worked with Pewabic Pottery to create a special memorial tile for her gravesite. The tile, which reflects her handmade style and blue and green glazing, will be permanently installed this spring. Perry's story and the tile memorial will be a special feature of the Friends' annual spring cemetery tour, which will take place at 1 p.m. on Saturday, May 11. Tickets are \$10; interested participants should meet at the east gate of the cemetery for the start of the tour.
